On behalf of the Daniel K. Inouye Institute, the Library of Congress and the William S. Richardson School of Law, we are pleased to invite you to view a live-stream of the Library of Congress - Daniel K. Inouye Distinguished Lecture Series on **Thursday, May 18, 2017 from 11:30 a.m. to 1:45 p.m. at the William S. Richardson School of Law, Classroom #2** on the University of Hawaii's Manoa campus. The lecture will take place at the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. and will be live-streamed to the Law School. The discussion will highlight the evolution of the Peace Corps and how its ideals remain relevant today - five decades after its founding.

The lecture is hosted by the Library of Congress' John W. Kluge Center, in conjunction with the Daniel K. Inouye Institute. This is the third lecture, in a five-year series, designed to celebrate the legacy of the late Daniel K. Inouye, who served as Hawaii's first U.S. representative and then as U.S. senator for nearly half a century. This lecture is titled, *Inspiring a Sense of Service and Idealism* featuring **The Honorable Elaine Chao**, Secretary of Transportation, and **Reed Hastings**, Chief Executive Officer, Netflix, moderated by **Ann Compton**, former ABC News White House Correspondent.

Secretary Chao, former director of the Peace Corps, and Mr. Hastings, a former Peace Corps volunteer, will reflect on their experiences with the Peace Corps, and as leaders in government and business. They will discuss the need for a spirit of service and idealism. In recognition of the centennial of the birth of President John F. Kennedy, this year's lecture was planned in collaboration with the Kennedy Center and the Peace Corps to focus on the values of service to the country and to the cause of peace held dear by both Kennedy and Inouye. Highlighting the importance Inouye placed on bipartisanship and moral courage, each lecture brings together voices from diverse backgrounds.
